I have viewed preliminary work on the project, as well as the Digital Archiving Network for Anthropology project. Overall, I am very impressed with the potential these project have for developing an engaging course of instruction. The Virtual Archaeology program promises to provide an ideal mix of innovation and scholarship for a successful outcome.

At MSUM, we try to provide the best possible instruction in archaeology, geosciences, and cultural anthropology that our resources allow. We are always on the look-out for new learning experiences to offer our students. We currently offer field studies in archaeology and cultural anthropology, as well as opportunities for hands-on laboratory work. We do not, however, presently have any technology-rich options available. I am very excited by the opportunity to add a computer-based learning game/environment to our teaching inventory.
